Warning - Any history walk in the city means crossing roads, always use the crossings and wait for the lights. Don't try and read this leaflet when you are crossing the road – Learn about Bristol's history – Don't become it!

- 01 Discover Bristol's medieval Parish Boundary markers. A hunt for very important but strange marks in old Bristol. [Click HERE to download Bristol Explorer 01 as a free sample!](#)
- 02 Discover out why a road in New York, USA is made from Bristol's bombed houses
- 03 The Bristol Clock with two minute hands - discover how it kept Bristolians ahead of their times.
- 04 Bristol - 'City of Towers' - discover where all these are. Can you unravel David's picture?
- 05 Bristol has England's only public clock with a second hand, find out why it strikes for ten minutes every evening.
- 06 Here in Bristol - the plumber's dream that resulted in better musket balls and, probably, silvery banisters.
- 07 Unseen Bristol - #1 Clifton – Hansel & Gretel's House – maybe? This and many others.
- 08 Unseen Bristol - #2 Queens Road – 'Washington's Breach' and so on.
- 09 Unseen Bristol - #3 Centre, Corn Street & Castle Park area. "Here be Dragons!" - find out where.
- 10 Unseen Bristol - #4 Redcliffe. – A-mazing discoveries, a chaotic pendulum and other treasures, above and below.
- 11 Unseen Bristol - #5 Bedminster – the tree that cast a shadow – even on cloudy days.
- 12 Unseen Bristol - #6 Plaques – they commemorate the heroic, oddball or just plain bizarre – such as the Centaur that directs you to Bristol Centre
- 13 Unseen Bristol - #7 Specials, Bristol's hidden delights.
- 14 To meet John Cabot and his anachronistic friends.
- 15 Bristol's Monastic Moles - discover why 800 years ago they tunnelled beneath our city – see what we discovered.
- 16 Interested in Serpents? – They abound in Bristol – if you know where to look!
- 17 Have you spotted the Pavement Runes? Follow the pavements with us to find some, and learn what they mean.
- 18 How many fountains do you know about in Bristol? – come with us to find some unusual treasures.
- 19 A Church **completely inside** another Church – can still be seen today – The Crusader Knights give us a clue.
