

**Redland Past Revisited for the Redland Directory - No. 5 in a series.**

Dinner parties are the breeding ground of Urban Myths - the usually implausible events that happen to someone else. A case of in vino, but not necessarily veritas?

In Cranbrook Road, part of Bristol's 1920's expansion, a well maintained house with no occupants gave rise to this bizarre belief. Friends of newcomers moving from the centre of Bristol were concerned that there could be trouble from a Gypsy encampment on the banks of the Cran behind their house, (photographed by Bertram Tarr and given to me many years ago).

However concerns were allayed when it was explained that a tunnel led from Redland Road Police station to the mystery house – the tunnel exit, allowing police to be rushed through in the event of any 'Civil Insurrection'. This conjures up an image of a file of silver buttoned Bobbies, with truncheons at the ready, singing jolly policemen's songs such as Gilbert & Sullivan's 'When a felon's not engaged in his employment', and "He loves to hear the little brook a gurgling".

Enquiries into this absurd belief revealed the truth. The Cran Brook rising in Redland Green is culverted beneath Dugar Walk, Cranbrook Road, Clare Avenue, briefly emerging between Cranbrook and Elton Road flows to the River Frome. Credulous new residents coming from the 'city', enquiring about the reason for the tunnel were kidded into believing the story. However the real explanation is simple but sad. The owner was in care for many decades, and the house administered by the Court of Protection. Sorry to spoil a bizarre urban myth but it does conjure up an interesting image.
